At home and in school, the pupils in Lapwings have embraced a range of subjects, including geography, history, RE, art and science. In maths, the focus has been on fractions, finding equivalent fractions and converting proper to improper. The Chinese inspired artwork has been amazing and science has seen us complete a range of exciting experiments on separating. It has certainly been a busy half term!



Our Learning – In class and at home (cont'd)


Albatross


We've had another busy half term in Albatross Class; in History we've all loved learning about the French Revolution and how Napoleon became the Emperor of France and tried to conquer Europe, until he met in match with British Admiral Nelson at the Battle of Trafalgar! In Geography we've enjoyed learning about different regions of the UK including Yorkshire and Humberside; the children produced some super drawings of the Humber Bridge and Ribblehead Viaduct showing how and why the landscape has changed by the construction of these immense structures. We've also conducted some super science experiments in class and lots of the children at home have also been conducting their own experiments including testing the density of different liquids — as you can from the picture Miss Prosser very much enjoyed this one too! In amongst all of this we've learnt about the beautiful art of Chinese painting as well as getting a full understanding of the selfless and caring nature of Sikhism who strongly believe in equality and how above all else they believe in helping others before themselves which is a lovely message for us all to learn from. It was also lovely to see so many of the Albatrosses on our 'Bring Your Pet to Zoom' session. We met lots of pets including a snake!




Oystercatchers
